\* Elaboration and Craft are double-weighted categories: Whatever score a student would get in these categories is worth double the amount of points. For examples, if a student exceeds expectations in Elaboration, then that student would receive 8 points instead of 4 points.

\*\* A score of 0 points indicates the student did not make an attempt or a lack/absence of evidence of Pre-Kindergarten skill.

In each row, circle the descriptor in the column that matches the student work. Scores in the categories of Elaboration and Craft are worth double the point value (4, 5, 6, 7, or 8 instead of 2, 2.5, 3, 3.5, or 4).

Total the number of points and then track students' progress by seeing when the total points increase.
